

In the book, 500 Most Influential Muslims of 2009 published by Georgetown University, Washington DC, Maulana Wahiduddin Khan has been called "Islam's Spiritual Ambassador to the world." He has been internationally recognized for his contributions to world peace, having received, among others, the Demiurgus Peace International Award, the Padma Bhushan, the Rajiv Gandhi National Sadbhayna Award and the National Citizen's Award.

Maulana Wahiduddin Khan was born in Azamgarh (U.P.) in 1925, and educated at an Islamic seminary. From his very childhood, he showed a voracious appetite for modern knowledge, spending entire days in the library. Well versed in both classical Islamic learning and modern science, his research led him to conclude that the need of the hour was to present Islamic teachings in the modern or contemporary idiom. His life since then has been devoted to addressing the contemporary mind and presenting Islam to the world as a complete ideology of

peace in the modern idiom.



His first book, Naye Ahad Ke Darwaze Par, or 'On the Threshold of a New Era' was the result of his exhaustive study. He elaborated upon this in his next work, Ilme Jadid Ka Challenge, or 'Islam and Modern Challenges', which was later published as 'God Arises'. This book is accepted as the standard Islamic position on modern thought and has been

incorporated in the curricula of universities in many Arab countries. It has been translated into various languages,

such as English, Arabic, Malay, Turkish, Hindi, Malayalam and Sindhi. Its Arabic version has been published under the title of *Al-Islam Yatahadda* and has become popular in the Arab world.

The culmination of his research was his book, Al Islam, which has been published in English as 'The Vision of Islam.' In it he presents in the modern idiom the interpretation of the Islamic scriptures



To give full expression to these positive ideas, the Maulana established the *Islamic Centre* at New Delhi in 1970. Subsequently, the organ of the Centre, 'Al-Risala', the



monthly magazine, launched in Urdu in 1976, continues to be published till today. This journal, consisting almost entirely of his own articles, quickly acquired a wide circulation throughout the Urdu-speaking world, and has done much to make people understand the peaceful face of Islam, to awaken in Muslims a new awareness of their social responsibilities and to promote positive thinking and action. The first issues of the English and Hindi versions of Al-Risala

were launched in February 1984, and December 1990 respectively. The English

version continues to be published under the title of 'The Spiritual Message' and now is being published as the 'Spirit of Islam'.

Presenting Islam as a complete ideology of peace, he presents to the world the true face of Islam based, as it is, on peace, tolerance, pluralism and co-existence and helps people understand their purpose in life by explaining the creation plan of God. Besides his


books numbering over 200 he has written thousands of articles for national and international dailies and magazines and given thousands of lectures in Urdu and English that have been preserved for posterity. This material presents Islam 'as it is' as exemplified in the early period of Islam. One who wants to understand Islam has simply to refer to this material for guidance.

He has analyzed the issue and presented the counter ideology—the ideology of peace—in his hundreds of articles and many books, such as 'The Ideology of Peace', 'True |ihad', 'Islam and Peace', 'The Prophet of Peace:Teachings of The Prophet Muhammad' published by Penguin Books, 'Islam and World Peace' and 'Political Interpretation of Islam?

Quoting UNESCOs dictum that as violence begins from the minds of men, it can only be eliminated at the level of the mind; the Maulana says that the jihadist mentality can be re-directed towards peace by projecting the ideology of peace based on the Quran and Hadith. Once they appreciated that their

peace and spirituality and the meaning understanding of Islam based on its political interpretation has nothing to do with Islam, they give it up on their own. After reading his books, many Kashmiris and Pakistanis

with jihadist mindsets have left off violence and are working in the fields of education, peace and interfaith. He says that this material has to be spread globally in various languages for the issue to be resolved once and for all.



To carry on his mission of peace, the Maulana established *CPS International*, Center for Peace and Spirituality, in 2001 at New Delhi, India as a non-political, non-profit and non-governmental organization. As is apparent from its name, the organization aims to promote and reinforce the culture of peace through mind-based spirituality. The center helps individuals to re-engineer their minds towards a culture of peace by living God-oriented lives. The center believes that when such positive, spiritual individuals prevail in society, it will result in a peaceful world.



During interfaith efforts he explains that the Quran is a divine book revealed to the Prophet Muhammad in the first quarter of the seventh century. The Quran does not claim to be a superior book or a complete book. All the books sent by God were originally one and the same. The only merit that can be claimed for the Quran is that it is a book of divine revelation faithfully preserved as regards text and language in its original form. This gives the Quran authenticity and credibility, so that one may study it with the conviction that it God's

preserved Message for mankind.

The Maulana explains that the message of the Quran is to make man aware of the Creation Plan of God or what is the purpose of man's life on earth. According to



the divine plan, man was created as an eternal being. The Creator divided man's life into two parts, the pre-death period and the post-death period. The pre-death period is the testing period and the post-death period is the period for reward. The pre-death period is temporary, while the post-death period is to last for all eternity. Man's test is basically a freedom-based test. One who misuses his freedom will be deprived of God's blessings and one who uses his freedom properly will be rewarded with eternal paradise. The Quran gives all the necessary details of this divine scheme.

Containing one hundred and fourteen chapters, the original text of the Quran is preserved in Arabic and its translation is available in all the major languages including English. Although written originally in Arabic, the Quran has been made accessible, thanks to translations, to those who have no knowledge of Arabic. While no substitute for the original, translations of Al-Quran spread the word of God far beyond the

Arabic speaking peoples to a far broader spectrum of humanity, thus, serving the unique purpose of conveying the eternal guidance of God to all mankind.

While many translations of the Arabic preserved Quran were available, Maulana Wahiduddin Khan felt that a translation and commentary of the Quran in the modern scientific idiom was still needed. He translated the Quran into Urdu along with its commentary entitled *Tazkirul Quran*. This is also available in Hindi (*Pavitra Quran*) and in Arabic (*Al Tazkirul Qaweem fi Tafseeril Quran il Hakeem*). English has become the truly international language with over 75% of the world population understanding it. The Quran Complex, Madinah, Saudi Arabia conducted research on the impact of the various translations of the Quran in English. They concluded:

Maulana Wahiduddin Khan with his team worked tirelessly to translate the Quran and commentary into English, which is published under the title, 'The Quran'. The feedback about this translation is that it is lucid, easy to understand and in contemporary English. Some of the feedback is given below:

Millions of copies of 'The Quran' have been distributed worldwide and has received world-wide acceptance. It is considered easy to understand. Besides English and Urdu, its translations are now available in Braille (English), German, Spanish, French, Hindi, Marathi, Telugu and Malyalam and its commentary in Arabic, Hindi, Telugu and Marathi. Efforts are on to translate it into all international and Indian languages.

The Maulana's vision is to facilitate the entry of the message of peace and spirituality into each and every home in the world and to usher in an era of global peace and unity. Through the CPS and its global chapters, the Maulana has prepared a team of Ambassadors of Peace and Spirituality to spread the message of peace to the world. On that occasion, he was awarded the Demiurgus Peace International Award by the Nuclear Disarmament Forum AG. The award was given to acknowledge his outstanding achievements in strengthening peace among nations and for his efforts to develop a complete ideology of peace and present Islamic teachings that address the modern

mind. He has also been awarded the title of Ambassador of Peace by the International Federation for World Peace.
